




DESCRIPTION OF THE COMMUNITY SERVED

Community Definition and Description

In this document, community is defined as the resident population within the hospital's service area. Committed to addressing health disparities and serving communities with impactful solutions that leverage shared resources and coordinate care, the health agencies that make up the VCCHIC have come together in defining their service area as the County of Ventura.

Located in Southern California, Ventura County has a land area of 1,843.1 square miles which encompasses 10 cities, 23 census- designated places, and 15 other unincorporated communities. According to 2022 Claritas Pop-Facts, Ventura County has a population of 842,465 and is the 13th largest county in terms of population. Figure 1 illustrates the population size in Ventura County by zip code. The most populated zip codes are 93033 (Oxnard), 93065 (Simi Valley), 93030 (Oxnard), and 93063 (Simi Valley) with population totals of 82,273; 74,289; 60,815; and 55,685 respectively. FINDINGS FROM THE 2022 CHNA

VCCHIC conducted its
2022 Community Health
Needs Assessment (CHNA)
between January and June
2022. The purpose of the
CHNA was to identify and
prioritize the significant
health needs of
the community.

Methods for Identifying Community Needs

Primary Data included more than 15 focus groups including represented and vulnerable populations of Focus group participants included persons from the black community, monolingual Hispanic or Latino Spanish speakers, older adults, LGBTQIA+ persons, students, and those accessing mental health and substance use treatment services among others. In collaboration with California State Channel Islands University and Pacifica High Primary Data Collection School in Oxnard, CA, VCCHIC was also able to receive input from local high school and college students about the issues impacting them.

Summary of Findings

Health needs were determined to be significant if they met the following criteria:

- Secondary data analysis: top 10 health needs as ranked by HCI's Data Scoring Tool
- Survey analysis: identified by 25% or more of respondents as a priority issue
- Qualitative analysis: frequency topic was discussed within/across focus groups
- Life expectancy data: analysis of leading causes of death, leading causes of premature death and all-cause mortality

Through this criteria, fifteen needs emerged as significant. Figure 2 illustrates the final 15 significant health needs, listed in alphabetical order, that were included for prioritization based on the findings of all forms of data collected for the VCCHIC 2022 CHNA.

VCCHIC convened a group of community leaders to participate in a presentation of data on the 15 significant health needs. Following the presentation, participants engaged in a discussion and were asked to complete an online prioritization activity.

Process and Criteria

The online prioritization activity included two criteria for prioritization:

- Magnitude of the Issue
- Ability to Impact

Participants assigned a score of 1-3 to each health topic and criterion, with a higher score indicating a greater likelihood for that topic to be prioritized. Numerical scores for the two criteria were then combined and averaged to produce an aggregate score and ranking for each health topic.

Prioritization Results

After discussing the results of the prioritization process, the VCCHIC founding members agreed to include each of the 15 significant health needs as subtopics to three prioritized significant health needs. The three priority health needs are shown in Table 1.

Prioritized Significant Health Needs

The first prioritized significant health need, Addressing Mental Health and Substance Use Across the Lifespan included Adverse Childhood Experiences (encompassing Adolescent Health, Substance Use, Housing Overcrowding and Education) and Health and Wellness for Older Adults. The second prioritized

significant health need, Prevention of Chronic Conditions by Promoting Healthy Lifestyles, includes chronic disease related sub-topics like Diabetes, Cancer, Weight Status, Physical Activity, Heart Disease and Stroke and Nutrition and Healthy Eating. The third and final prioritized significant health need is Advancing Equitable Access to Healthcare.

The Substance Use Program (SUN) has become an essential service for the community. The dedicated Navigator works directly with the Emergency Department (ED), Case Management, and Social Work teams to focus on identifying patients through a screening process in the ED, coordinates services including the implementation of Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT), Narcan, and transitional patient long-term care. The SUN program provided services for approximately 400 patients entering a treatment center with a 50% success rate. The Substance Use Navigator participated in community education and awareness events including the Simi Valley Spring and Fall Street Fair, Cops 'N Cruisers, National Night Out, Moorpark College Health Fair, New Beginnings Fentanyl Awareness event, and Live at 5 in the 805 Radio and 99.1 The Ranch radio interviews at the Farmers Market. Collateral materials and free Narcan Kits were made available to the community. The SUN and AHSV Registered Nurse conducted presentations to students on the topics of oncology and substance use disorders. The Emergency Department participated in the annual Every 15 Minutes program. A two-day mock style event focuses on high school juniors and seniors emphasizing the impacts of drinking, driving, mental health, personal safety, and the responsibility of making mature decisions. A 13-minute YouTube video was created by students and is shown at the school assembly.	

AHSV sponsored the Free Clinic of Simi Valley annual 5K/10K where funds raised help support individuals experiencing depression, suicide, and other mental health issues.

Year 2 January 1 – December 31, 2024

In collaboration with VCCHIC, Adventist Health Simi Valley (AHSV) continues to identify programs and services focused on healthy behaviors, access to physical activities and healthy foods. AHSV is deeply rooted in the community and participates in several community events annually supporting physical activity, outreach and education, guest speaker series, training and collaboration with organizations who are involved in servicing our vulnerable populations, along with advocacy for better health.

In 2024, Adventist Health Simi Valley's Farmers Market opened to the community and AHSV associates on March 5, where individuals have access to purchase fresh fruits, vegetables, honey, nuts, and more from certified local vendors. The Farmers Market participates in the CalFresh EBT program to support community members experiencing food insecurities and the convenience of purchasing healthier food options at a local farmers market.

The Farmers Market offered monthly themed activities to promote well-being and healthy food options, lifestyles included activities, games, prizes, and giveaways.
